The Lady Milne Trophy

A Brief History



The Lady Milne Trophy began life in 1934 as the Ladies' Team Championship of the National Bridge Association run by Hubert Phillips. Then in 1950 it became the trophy for the Ladies' Home Internationals, with entry limited to one team from each country (previously, entry was open to many teams).

The event is now played over one weekend for women's teams from England, Scotland, Wales, Northern Ireland, and the Republic of Ireland. Since 2009, the host nation has added a second team, under the name of the federation, to make an even six. This team can win the trophy, and indeed an English Bridge Union team did so in 2010. Teams play a head-to-head match of 32 boards again each of the other five. In 2011, for the first time in 62 years, the series ended in a tie, the trophy being shared by England and Scotland. The regulations were subsequently amended to make a tie less likely.

England has won outright on 52 occasions (including the EBU win in 2010), and is the defending champion. Scotland has won outright 15 times, Wales 4 times, and Northern Ireland twice. The Republic of Ireland, which joined the series in 1998, has yet to win. The hosts are hoping that, after a narrow and painful defeat last year, this year might be the time to break the duck!

Each team has its own room and seats its N/S Pair there throughout. The E/W Pairs move to the room of their opponents for each match. In the first stanza, the captain of the second-named team nominates their line-up first; in the second stanza the first-named captain nominates first.

THE LADY MILNE TROPHY

Format

The Lady Milne Trophy comprises six teams, the sixth team being fielded, in rotation, by the country hosting the event. In 2024 Ireland fields two teams, one as "Ireland" the other as "CBAI".

The competition sees five head-to-head matches of 32 boards in 16-board stanzas, the two teams from Ireland playing against each other in the first match.

Teams consist of a maximum of six players. Seating rights alternate between the two teams. In the first stanza the captain of the second-named team nominates their line-up first; in the second stanza the first-named captain nominates first.

Public Presentation

In any one session, three matches are in progress. The play in each match is broadcast on the internet via RealBridge. Entry to the Closed Room is prohibited. The Closed Rooms will be clearly marked on the doors to each room.

Smoking and Alcohol

Please note that smoking is not permitted anywhere in the hotel. In addition the consumption of alcohol is not permitted in the playing areas.

Mobile Phones

Mobile phones and electronic devices capable of communication must be switched off in the playing area and be visible at the table at all times. Any player leaving the playing table prior to completion of the session must leave her mobile phone and electronic devices at the table. Spectators in the Vugraph theatre are requested to ensure that mobile phones are switched off.

Regulations for Open Room Spectators

You may watch the players live in the Open Room (Open Rooms will be clearly marked on the doors of each room) provided you observe the following rules:

- A spectator may not enter the Open Room while play is in progress. This also applies even if a match has started before the advertised starting time.
- If a spectator leaves the Open Room while play is in progress, they may not return until the play session (i.e. the match) has been completed.
- During play in the Open Room spectators must refrain from mannerisms or remarks and must not converse with a player or display any reaction to bidding or play.
- Spectators are permitted to observe the cards of one player only.
- A spectator should be seated behind a single player and may not get up to walk round the table or seek to look at the cards of any other player.
- Spectators are not permitted to sit where they can see the screen of the BBO operator covering the match on the internet.
- Spectators may not draw attention to any irregularity or mistake nor speak on any question except by request of the Director.
- The Director in Charge and/or the Match Manager is empowered to control the presence of spectators, individually or collectively.
- Under no circumstances may a member of the audience enter the Closed Room.

Liz McGowan & Fiona McQuaker



Liz is Scotland's only World and European Grand Master, thanks to a purple patch when she played for Great Britain before the home nations were granted separate status. She won two European Women's Championships playing with Heather Dhondy; and the inaugural World Transnational Teams playing with some great Icelanders she and Heather picked up in the bar.

She has also won 2 silver medals at World Team Olympiads playing with Sandra Penfold. She has played in a record 37 Lady Milnes, winning 11 of them, also 7 Camrose series and 6 Teltscher Trophies. Liz is a bridge teacher and journalist, heavily involved with bridge administration in Scotland and she is currently the SBU representative on BGB.



Fiona has played for Scotland in the women's team on many occasions, and this will be her 21st Lady Milne, winning on 6 occasions. She has played in the Scottish women's team in seven European Championships, and four Olympiads/World Games. With several others in this team she reached the semi-final of the World Games in Wroclaw in 2016 and the Venice Cup in

Wuhan in 2019. She returned to face-to-face bridge after 2 years, at the SBU Peebles congress teams in March 2022, and this was quickly followed by another Scottish cap at the Venice Cup in Salsomaggiore for which the team had only three weeks' notice; they nevertheless produced a top half finish. She is a chartered accountant working in Edinburgh, and enjoys travelling, theatre-going and walking, and is also displaying considerable skills at fantasy football.

Sheila Adamson & Abi Milne



Sheila has been a frequent member of the Scottish Women's Team since 2004, originally playing with Anne Symons and more recently Abi Milne. In that time she has won six Lady Milne events. She has also played in 8 European Championships and World Bridge Games. Sheila's job involves quality assurance in transnational education, which means working with very nice people

and attending a lot of committees. She used to spend a lot of time in airports; now she spends a lot of time on Microsoft Teams.



Abi is a recent addition to the women's scene, having left the ranks of the Juniors in 2018 in an attempt to emulate the better-known members of the Scotland ranks. As it so happened, she managed to do so at the first attempt with her current partner Sheila, and was therefore part of the winning Lady Milne team on her debut. At that time she was still playing under her maiden name, so celebrated shortly after by adopting

the Milne name by marrying Jake. Abi has a very good temperament for the game, so don't try to ruffle her at the table. You will just be wasting your time! She is a systems analyst by day, keen writer by night and now an accomplished bridge player in the space between.

Brian Short (NPC)



Brian played bridge for Great Britain on three occasions before Scotland got international autonomy, with longtime partner Sandy Duncan. He has played in 55 Camrose weekends with five different partners, winning on three occasions. He has also played 7 times in the senior Camrose and has made multiple European and Olympiad appearances in Open, Senior and Mixed

events. He has captained or coached the Scottish womens' team on 16 occasions. At least he thinks it is 16. "My mind is a bit numb now", he explained recently, declining to offer a view on why it was numb. He won the Gold Cup in 2006 and has multiple wins in every major Scottish event, including Scotland's premier teams' competition (the Scottish Cup) which he has won on 15 occasions. Two sons, a daughter and six grandchildren keep him busy and as elder son lives in Melbourne and younger son in Switzerland, Kate and he have plenty of excuse to travel.

Anne learnt to play bridge in her teens in Edinburgh in the 1980s, where she played for the Scottish Junior team and won the Ladies teams, before moving south aged 22. After qualifying as a Chartered Accountant Anne moved to London to be with her now husband, Neil Rosen. Away from the table Anne works for the Bank of England but is now looking forward to retiring

as soon as she can. Over the years Anne has had considerable success in national competitions including the Pachabo, Tollemache, Hubert Phillips and NICKO. Internationally Anne has played representative bridge with Val Curran, Gillian Fawcett, Catherine Draper, Catherine Seale, Sarah Bell, and Nevena Senior. Anne was also part of the team that won the Mind Sport Games in Beijing in 2008. This is Anne's 10th Lady Milne and 3rd playing with Nevena.



I started playing bridge during my final year at University, and my first husband introduced me to the game. I teach and play bridge both on line and face-toface-the latter in London at Andrew Robson's BC, Wimbledon BC and the Acol club. Between then and now I have played in and won a lot of women's and domestic open events, including another five world championships. The most recent was the world women's teams in partnership

with Fiona Brown in 2018. Nowadays I make my living mostly by professional bridge of one sort or another: writing (I am the columnist for the Sunday Times), playing and teaching online – trying to share my passion (obsession maybe!) for the game with others!



I was taught to play bridge by my parents at aged 11 and played a lot of rubber bridge at university. I then had a career as a management consultant and also two sons, so bridge took a back foot in my life for many years. Just before covid I found my way back to Andrew Robson and my bridge passion was reignited. I became an American National Champion in 2021 playing with

Heather Dhondy and won a bronze medal at the World Open Transnationals in Marrakesh partnering Michael Byrne. I am excited to be partnering Sally Brock in my first Lady Milne. Later in the year I will be playing in the mixed European Championships again partnering Michael and with Heather on the team. I have just moved to Italy with my husband and I am planning on checking out the Italian bridge scene, as opposed to our current obsession with the Italian food scene!

She was also part of the winning England Women's team in

the 2012 and 2016 European Championships, and Great Britain's winning team in the 1997, 1999 and 2001 European Championships. Heather won the Silver medal in the Venice Cup in Bali in 2013 and European Championships in 2014, won the Bronze medal in the Venice Cup in 2015 and the Olympiad in Istanbul in 2004, and won the World Mixed Teams in Rhodes in 1996. In addition, she has won a record 13 Lady Milne trophies; eight of them partnering Sally Anoyrkatis, and five in partnership with Nicola Smith.
